History Repeats Itself ...

Well, maybe it will in about 6 months, depending upon how cold it gets next winter... As I heard this morning (June 19) on CBC news, a milk surplus is forcing the Canadian dairy industry to dump large volumes of skim milk on farms and into sewer systems, and for use as low cost pig feed. This has been brought on by an unprecedented demand for more high-fat milk products such as butter and cream, and less demand for fluid milk. ([Follow this link to a Globe and Mail article.](#))

I have a post card and calendar which clearly show that this sort of surplus has happened before, and demonstrate one innovative, but unfortunately seasonal way to make use of the surplus.

A calendar produced by Thunder Bay Parks and Recreation in 1988, celebrated 100 years of service to the community. It was a standard 8.5" x 11" flip-style wall calendar, with the top half showing photograph(s), caption(s) and other information about the subjects of the pictures. The bottom half showed the days/weeks of the month in question, noting events scheduled for the month. As well, historical facts from the Parks & Rec departments were included in the square for the day of the month on which they had occurred. From a copy of that calendar, which I purchased from Derek Dalton many years ago, comes the following text.

"SKIM MILK RINK"

"Thunder Bay has a long tradition of the community providing recreation opportunities in concert with local Parks Boards and Civic Recreation Committees. One example of this was the Skim Milk Rink, first iced in 1938 by the Thunder Bay Co-operative Dairy with help from about 30 residents of the south end of Port Arthur. The 100 by 200 foot surface was first iced with water and then with skim milk, which at that time was considered to be the waste product of milk. Mr. Hansen, the manager of the dairy, claimed that the milk gave a "smooth, almost steel surface."

This unusual community project was internationally famous and newspapers around the world carried news of the rink. It was featured in Ripley's Believe It or Not column. On a C.B.C. radio show called "Canadian Snapshots" on February 21, 1940, a golden-tongued Ralph Parker described "the skaters skimming over the ice"!

Many special events were held at the rink which drew crowds of 1,200 to 1,400 skaters. At Winter Carnivals, the Queen of the Co-Op Milk Skating Rink was crowned. One night a hockey game featured two clowns as goaltenders, with the rest of the teams sporting brooms and a single skate each.

Today the Parks and Recreation Department provides more than 60 outdoor rink sites including over 100 ice surfaces for the enjoyment of Thunder Bay residents."

The calendar shows a copy of the original photo post card, supplied by the Thunder Bay Historical Museum Society, and like many of the photographs in the calendar, is shown artistically with photo mounting corners, as if in an album. For this article, I scanned the real photo card from my own collection. It was much clearer than the image in the calendar.

If today's glut of skim milk continues, we may see milk rinks popping up again. Someone might have to send an e-mail to the C.B.C. or the Dairy Farmers of Ontario.

Minutes of the Meeting of May 27, 2015

Held at Fortinos, Plains Road, Burlington

Number of Attendees: 12

Chaired by: Jon Soyka

And so we began ... with a general discussion.

Jon noted that the Community Room at Fortinos is significantly larger than the Red Cross location, but unfortunately, the lights may not be turned off for presentations which involve use of any sort of projector. Various possibilities for returning to the Red Cross were discussed, including the possibility of members making a donation to cover the extra costs of renting there, which would be acceptable to the Red Cross. Despite that, we can't grow there. We have been at capacity some evenings, so there would be no point advertising the meetings. We couldn't take a chance that more people might attend than could be accommodated in the room (20 people). Also, parking is an issue. Jon noted that after showing the Fortinos representative a clause in our incorporation papers indicating that we are a not-for-profit group, Fortinos agreed that we were entitled to use the Community Room at Fortinos free of charge, and he has tentatively booked the room for our meetings for the next year.

We discussed the post card offerings of a few dealers – Bill from Tapleystown who sells at the Ancaster and Woodstock shows, and the Tanners from Michigan who sell on eBay (Debbie Tanner is originally from Thunder Bay).

We moved on to our show and tell session. Sanna Sinclair brought some cards that she had bought in Orillia, and coincidentally, they were four “then and now” cards of Orillia locations. The top of each card featured an old view, and the present-day image was shown on the bottom. One card showed the Opera House, then and now.

Marg Brown has been making good use of Mike Smith’s Patriotic Handbook in her hunt for cards, and has found some more F.H. Leslie cards that weren’t included in his books. She showed us cards of women working in the trenches in World War I. The First Aid Nursing Yeomanry (FANY) Corps was British and was raised in 1907. It was originally a mounted unit, since it was faster for women on horseback to reach the wounded. British nurses wanted to help out, but the British didn’t want them. Belgium and France were happy to let them run hospitals and first aid stations. [For more information, visit this [Wikipedia article](#).] A card of the War Correspondents Society of New York City was produced, and it is still going strong today. Marg also had a card which may have been of the Winnipeg General Strike, and she told us a few interesting stories, almost turning her opportunity to “show and tell” into a presentation. She had a few cards that weren't in Mike's books, and will send him scans.

We looked again at Jon's mystery cards, trying to find any clues about where the residence might have been. The word on the smokestack far behind the building looks as though it contains the letters "VER". No doubt Jon will let us know if (make that “when”) the location is discovered.

Bill Nancekivell had a card of a band, which he suspects are the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders.

Beth Mills brought some cards to show; from the Netherlands (1985), a map with colourful pictures; Florence at night; a Tunisia panorama postmarked Toronto (1974) with 3 Italian stamps. Apparently, some postal employee wasn't paying attention.

Jon Soyka recently bought 22 cards out of England, including F.H. Leslie cards. Scenes included Hamilton Courthouse, surrounded by John & Hughson & Main Streets; a house in Hamilton with lots of vines from the "Home" series, at 891 Concession; a real photo card of Stinson Street School; a real photo of a horse and carriage on Beckett Drive. He is writing an article (with post cards) for Escarpment Magazine which may or may not be included depending upon how well the article fits the publication. He bought 2 interesting post cards, one being a bookmark card of Highfield School, which moved to Westdale and later became Hillfield Strathallan College which is on Fennell Avenue, and the second card entitled "The Marsh, Hamilton", the location of which is unknown. He showed a card of Alderman Bryers, who was responsible for the "house built in a day". There was also a "Thumbs Up Revue" card, from the Vi-Tone Company, Hamilton Ontario. It was a promo card for their powdered milk product, showing various acts which were appearing in the revue. "Powdered Milk (fortified) as presented to the boys on Active Service by the makers of VI-TONE - the nation's health drink".

Beth Mills, who will be moving to B.C. this summer, brought some sheets of stamps, which were available for members to buy. She had stamps of the Canadian War Museum, a Japan sheet, and bridges (Pont Jacques Cartier, Angus L. Macdonald Bridge, Canso Causeway and Souris Swinging Bridge). Beth is leaving for B.C. on July 3. The truck which will contain many of her worldly goods leaves on the 5th. She will settle in the Langley-Abbotsford area. Her daughter is in Whistler. She doesn't have a place to live yet, but has many relatives in the area, so she has time to look around. We hope that she will stay in touch and let us know how she's doing.

We took a break and stretched our legs, bought beverages, did grocery shopping, talked. At least one person looked at plants. The location could prove handy. We won't have to pick up groceries on the way home. We'll have bought them already.

Jon continued with his Doubles presentation, with inclusions from a few other members. Lorne Smith contributed a view of the Cuthbert's Building in Johannesburg, South Africa at Pritchard and Eloff Streets. The building is deserted today, with street vendors outside at ground level. The building had housed an upper class dispenser of finery to the mining town, and was declared a national monument on June 27, 1986. Since the change in power which occurred in 1994, whites have moved to the suburbs, and there has been no urban renewal. Eloff Street was once the greatest shopping street in the city. Lorne also had views of the Park Railway Station in Johannesburg, another landmark which has been saved. It is elevated with no tracks going in or out at ground level. Discussion moved on to the Church Street Cemetery in Pretoria, which contains the graves of Paul Kruger (president of the South African Republic 1883-1900) and Breaker Morant (an Australian who came to fame in the Boer War of 1899-1902, played by Edward Woodward in the movie). There are Canadians buried there as well. [19 according to [Veterans' Affairs'](#) web site]

We went back to Jon's official "Doubles" presentation, where we saw Eaton's, the Bank of Hamilton, City Hall, a current view of James Street North, the Grafton's Fire, the block where the Sirloin Cellar and it's notable sign are located, along with a parking lot and a drug store. We saw 2 T's, Tredell & Tobey, which is currently a vacant space next to the Lister Block. The facade of the Thomas Building (46-52 James St. N.) has been kept for redevelopment and is stored in crates, although the structure was demolished. We saw 70 James Street North, Hamilton Lunch & Restaurant, the Bank of Hamilton, Bank of Commerce, the Landed Banking and Loan Co. at the corner of James and Main, the Dominion Public Building, John Sopinka Courthouse at Main & John Streets. Venus Sweets & Tea Room, which was located at 79 King E. at John, is currently The Jump Off. We saw the Park Station of the Hamilton Fire Department, located at Strathcona Avenue W at Head Street; CUNA House at 430 Whitney, which kept the address 430 even though it was on the "odd-number" side of the street. It is now Womankind/Rygiel Home with the address of 431 Whitney. Things change in Hamilton, even addresses. A card of South Park Avenue was found to belong to a location on Burlington Beach. Jon called Fred Briggs for assistance on that question. All Beach Strip streets were renamed so as not to duplicate Hamilton's street names. South Park Avenue is now Rembe Avenue (pronounced Rem-bee). [There are several relevant posts online. This [link](#) is worth checking since it links to other articles and maps, and even includes comments from Fred. If you believe an early post on that site, South Park was renamed Yale. Perhaps several incarnations have occurred.] We saw "Our Home" at 74 Robinson Avenue, which has since undergone renovations.

We saw Lightle's Garden Centre which was at #20 Highway north of #8 Highway, and the Stamp Coin Shop, which is now a strip mall at 136 Centennial Parkway North, and includes a Zorro Muffler shop. 1032 Barton Street East at Balmoral was once the G.A. Dingwall Hardware Store and is now Soul Water, a bottled water store. Rankins at 1342 Main Street East near Kenilworth is still Rankins, but back in the day, it was a china shop and their claim to fame was having a bull run through it – captured on a post card. Now, Rankins is a road house serving excellent chicken wings. Jon showed a card of "A Mountain Drive, Hamilton" The Sherman Cut. It showed the location from above. Jon did the best he could at photographing the location today, but wasn't willing to risk life and limb to duplicate the shot. Jon encouraged people to take their cameras, get out there, and shoot! He'd like to continue the collection of then and now images. The images don't have to be of Hamilton and the immediate area.

At the Dundas Heritage Society meeting, it was reported that someone from Aurora is places where William Lyon MacKenzie stayed after the Upper Canada rebellion of 1837. Apparently one of those locations was a cave in Dundas.

Members were asked if they knew of anyone who would be willing to speak at an upcoming meeting. Beth Mills volunteered to give a talk next month. Her great-grandfather was the longest-serving president of the Ontario Agricultural College, which will be the subject of her talk.

Jon said that book sales froze due to the severe winter conditions. We will have elections for the executive next month. Ron Sinclair asked if any advertising could be done for the club to generate new members, even in the store. There is a sign on the door before the meeting, and the Fortinos staff are aware of who is using the room well in advance of the meetings. As of the meeting date, there had been 3,597 visitors to the web site (although not unique visitors. Every time one of us lands on the site, the counter advances by 1.) Until we have a permanent location, we are limited as to the advertising we can publicize in locations other than our web site. People are encouraged to look at <https://www.facebook.com/VintageHamilton>. It was noted that Janet Forjan-Freedman is no longer updating her www.hamiltonpostcards.com web site, although the site is still live. Beth Mills suggested that we should cultivate a presence on Facebook and volunteered to start a page for us. Sanna Sinclair offered to help, but preferred to maintain, rather than designing the page.

The meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.
